Leather Magenta Sacks; Fancy Pelissier, Half Morocco and Full Morocco, lined; Leather Pelissier, Plain, With Pocket; Ladies' Leather Satchels, Gilt Mounted, and Steel Mounted, A. D. E. H. and O; Ladies' Quadrille Satchels, Plain Lock and Eagle Lock; Ladies' Muslin Satchels; Leather Lunch Bags, Drill Cloth Lunch Bags, Leather Cloth Lunch Bags and Ladies' Lunch Bags.

Twelve hired men and five hired women are employed in the shop now.

A Price-List of Preserved Fruits and Vegetables is in course of preparation. The list for this year comprises, Strawberries, Raspberries, Huckleberries, Plums, Peaches, Quinces, Pears, Pine-Apples; Pie-Fruits such as Pie-Plant, Apple and Huckleberries; String Beans, Sweet Corn, Tomatoes and Tomato Catsup. A variety of Jellies in pint and half-pint tumblers will also be put up. These comprise Strawberry, Blackberry, Peach, Currant, Quince, Crab-Apple, Plum; Black, Orange and Red Raspberry, Lemon, Grape and Pine-Apple.
