Shed is the third time I have writ to you in eight days; by three I have all my p[re]nt
we first made a w[ell] f[air] written purpos'd on Capt[ain] Montagu, and not quite loc'd on the other two being full. Gordon
may gett home, but I have not by good em opinion of him as the first. Yesterday I rec'd a letter from
Colonel Brington, who has not yett heard of the affront of last, but is preparing ad w[th] his com[mit]tee for their
removal, as also inform'd me, that the Afghans, and中国人 have taken two English gongs, shod & striking
to guard against to look for Europe, and that a Samara Divizion, had taken a small gunnery attack'd viz
metayzed into But you say letter was dated the 1st of March? Colonel Brington also inform'd me that Capt[ain]
Anthon[ius] Comodoro of the English frigat was at Sufroga, requiring the documents received from the French.
You may rememb'r that I told you at my coming to England, that I carry'd over with me Mr. Siddon a Lawyer,
with a designe to make him attorney generall star[ring] at my Admirall. I now him a Commission, and him Appoy to be
Solicitor Generall, the first by being too good a fellow quickly send him of my quicke & short remov'd
Mr. Goyen to his place, and made m[an] of Fullerton (a Relation of the Bishop of Salisbury) Solicitor, they are
both very ingenuous men, and good Lawyers, and have both good Estates, the first of his own, the other by his
wife. Remond Morris in Charles one of our great frigats, they are very desirous to be known to you, as
desire to make their applications, as they ought, by the next fleet, will certainly recommend several friends
to the Admirall by the next fleet, to be of the Admirall, but if he doth not change his course of life, I shall
never continu'd him there long. For he is an mighty bold fellow, but will not I shall never desire
action. And now my aduis to make these applications to you, as follows to this man and none;
If you go to Plandow with me, I trust you all proferty, and heartily thank you, for the kin
dness you have shew'd me to my Wif[fe]. I know a h[er]e representation of my Servt's may be
adventurous some; I have rec'd to Captain Stewart four hundred pound, for stores &c
furnished the Kingd[om] Shipp during the time of their fitting, and carrying the Div[ision] for us, paid
and sign'd by the Carpenter or Gunner, and Captain, sume also belonging money to every Captain at cap[er]t. It remains
request to take care of my servants, and pay them pretty money. For all which I designed to draw Bill upon
the Admirall of the Navy by the next fleet, which I hope will be better paid than the last. For my self
will fall into the ordinary course of the navy, and with testimony, if not w[ill] have the Kings Maj[est]y's command
must stand equally perisht. For provisions, and a small other Rob[es]. I am verayly out of the way of
account of what I have sent you by the next fleet, The last great voyage we took prouy dayly very neare
two, Especially the Master that was not far, for had not been for him, nothing of the Kings Maj[est]y's would
have staid, how come till they had been shippe'd from a road, and without doubt the loss of that arrize had
been very prejudiciall to the French. For neither was all the stores of that kind ready but into the last cart,
the publick Master. That is to say, that I have now by me and by a modest computation, strown to be worth
seven thousand pounds Sterling, many of the Cables and Cords etc. are too big for these ships
now, and therfore I doo design to cut them round, as soon as I have rec'd the opinion of the
Counsillors of the Admiralty to whom I have written severall times. It troubleth me much

that some force to attack General Nassau that would make so much for an hour that it would
be waste but no opportunity must be submitted to. I am Sir.


Extract

Since my writing his about Letter Wren is dead, and Butler as Eld's ^{is} appointed
to the command of the Squadron. I have lately received a Party of Troops and four hundred Infantry
from Mr. Colman by whom I am informed that he had about three thousand men of War, that the
Party he sent is now the less since they have in those parts the Society brought at Martinique almost
into water, by which means they have to take care of the plague that has destroyed over at least two
hundred men. So that I find the French are at present unable to figure what we are to do.
The French are a very lamentable affliction with us hitherto which promises you mortall; —
I cannot yet inform you with what force with the Squadron will I have ready from colonel Godwin
four thousand men but a true state of our affairs, and have acquainting him, that by mine and Butlers
Counsel, take considering the condition of our Squadron, and the weakness of the French, there is no
way left but to you and the Instruction of Wren received from the Commissioners of the Admiralty, which
is to return in the spring with the Bartado Merchant Fleet, sending two Ships to the General
Admiral, one to stay there, the other to convey their fleet home first to Jamaica, to do the same thing, and to
and then with me, so that we shall have two men of War, each a fireship, to support and help this fleet, this is the
only reasonable way I can think of providing of them, considering how unlikely it is for us
men to go to do any service, unless we have a considerable Supply from Europe; every man
and vessel we bring to the war, and by the next Vessel, you shall receive a full account
of resolutions.

I doubt but you will assist Mr. Monboult in getting the King his friend already sent home
and into that. I shall draw by your direction and Commission of the King, for the parsoning and fitting the
King's ships ready, because I have not as yet gotten notice of truce. Now by reason to correct the last Commission issued
General Pococke be sent to tomorrow or the next day of which the time he is taken up for the King's
ship. I wish you would post him of making some alteration in that indeed, which will be of great Ease and
convenience for me to add to your self soon.
