Dear Sir,

I have had the pleasure to receive your Letter by this Packet on the subject of Genl Jefferons Concerns with Mr Tyson

I have seen Mr Tyson and he promises to forward by the Ship St. Manning, which will sail on the 20<sup>th</sup> instans for London an unconditional authority to Messrs. Dennistons to pay the Reut, which they must know cannot be affected by the agitation of a question like that between us

Mr. Tyson has also made a proposal to me the result of which will be, upon certain terms to Ship Sugars which will meet the disbursements of Genl Jefferons, these terms require more deliberation than I have been able to give them. But the point shall be settled before the next packet sails; and in that settlement I shall bear in mind that it will not be for Genl Jefferons interest to press any point to such an extremity as to endanger the general provisions of a treaty which, in these disastrous times, is so peculiarly advantageous to him. I have no doubt.



that Messrs Demmestons already repeat that they  
are parties to a contract which promises so badly to  
Mr Tyson, - It will not therefore be prudent to sacrifice  
a main point by contending for one of minor importance.

I shall be obliged to you to furnish me with such  
Extract from Mr. Tyson's Letter as recognises / according to  
your account to him / my Requisition that Sugars  
should be reserved out of the standing Crop for the  
protection of Genl. Deffenson against  
all advances that is a point to which  
I have invariably adhered, but which  
Mr. Tyson very strangely does not consider  
to have been the understanding between us

I beg to return thanks for the copy of Pickwood's letter dated at  
Christopher's Feb 18. w<sup>ch</sup> you was so good to send me, it is certainly a more  
cheering complaisance than we have of late been accustomed to receive  
I hope to find it not painted fairer than it deserves - I presume you will  
not suffer this Packet to sail without sending him the Extracts of the  
Correspondence wrote for - I have often thought there was an collusion  
between Messrs P & I not exactly for my advantage & hope of a result  
may prove otherwise - Mr Pickwood seems perfectly aware of a  
necessity of holding Demmestons to even what they admit to be their engagement. Being  
satisfied of a difficulty Tyson w<sup>ch</sup> have in procuring other securities equally good - Tyson may  
perhaps have less difficulty in procuring other securities for the  
performance of Covenants &c - I presume it cannot be many days before the Com<sup>rs</sup> Mannings  
arrive by whom & by the next Packet I presume the Parties will write more fully I shall wait  
your Communication w<sup>th</sup> anxious expectation. If you have any good news to communicate
