

Cap<sup>t</sup> Matthew

London Oct<sup>r</sup> 5<sup>th</sup> 1636

Since p<sup>t</sup> ate of my last to you wh<sup>t</sup> goes by this fleet I have received a letter from Cap<sup>t</sup> Burnell dated 13<sup>th</sup> of October last importing That he had discoursed & come to an agreement w<sup>t</sup> you to rent my Plantation for 1000 pounds per annu during y<sup>e</sup>are of 1636 pounds & annu when y<sup>e</sup>are is made & and desier he to hasten out y<sup>e</sup> lease but it seems to me that he is very short in those previous matters wh<sup>t</sup> are to be knowne before I can prepare a lease for him which I will doe to his liking as well w<sup>t</sup> my owne but dont knowe But he may have desired something of that nature to y<sup>e</sup> letters or to Capt<sup>t</sup> Willets w<sup>t</sup> respect on this occasion tho<sup>t</sup> I have not yet received any for understanding that there was about May last a considerable number of acres of Canes ready to breake and that before y<sup>e</sup> tyme you did call upon Major Mackay to make them according to his agreement w<sup>t</sup> you but he refuseth upon having of a List or else you shd<sup>t</sup> allow for y<sup>e</sup> carriage of y<sup>e</sup> sugar that is to say my selfe when I was directed to shipp th<sup>e</sup> sugar that bargaine was broken w<sup>t</sup> a new one made w<sup>t</sup> Capt<sup>t</sup> Henry Burnell & Capt<sup>t</sup> Samuel Cook for same purpose and they begining upon y<sup>e</sup> day whereupon that season had lost y<sup>e</sup> Island I was in hopes to have had some acc<sup>t</sup> of my share of those sugars (as well as of what was formerly made to hatives by Major Mackay) but I dont think it my interest to leave any hindrance or ripe Canes on my plantation when a Tenant enters but to make my profit of them w<sup>t</sup> profit & adventure and for y<sup>e</sup> other Canes not ready to cut to just account shd<sup>t</sup> be taken of them of a number of acres distinguishing Plant<sup>t</sup> & Labour & of y<sup>e</sup> tree age of each acre wh<sup>t</sup> must be set downe to be inserted in y<sup>e</sup> lease (or to be in a schedule to be annexed thereto) same being to be left out of end of y<sup>e</sup> lease and in like manner for provisions of all sorts Then what moreables than are ought to be taken an account of but above al of y<sup>e</sup> Negroes their serv<sup>t</sup> ages that I may know what Cap<sup>t</sup> Burnell is to be acceptable for when he leaves y<sup>e</sup> plantation not doe I know y<sup>e</sup> day of his entry or from what tyme his lease must commence for I shall not looke upon him w<sup>t</sup> a tenant till such tyme as y<sup>e</sup> Canes ready to be cut were made of to halfe y<sup>e</sup> hundred betweene us  
Cap<sup>t</sup> Burnell takes no notice of y<sup>e</sup> secretaries to be named to secure payments of annual rents in hundre<sup>r</sup> years as they shall grow due for tho<sup>t</sup> y<sup>e</sup> present payment of y<sup>e</sup> money at y<sup>e</sup> day of satisfactory for a tym yet I can<sup>t</sup> think it reasonable to tie up my selfe by a lease without being secured of y<sup>e</sup> payment of y<sup>e</sup> rent ag<sup>r</sup> according to agreement betweene us I proposed to him y<sup>e</sup> lease made formerly to m<sup>r</sup> Delve for a president but as there must be variations according to y<sup>e</sup> present circumstances so I must be prepared by some alteration from him or you concerning his entry & from what tyme y<sup>e</sup> lease shd<sup>t</sup> commence concerning y<sup>e</sup> Negroes and touching y<sup>e</sup> secretaries as is before hasted The charges of drawing y<sup>e</sup> leases doth always belong to the Tenant & must be ingreded upon stamp'd parchment according to y<sup>e</sup> right of Parliament there being a duty layed upon it I am sorry I can<sup>t</sup> rememb<sup>r</sup> the sense of leases by this fleet as peffably y<sup>e</sup> last may expect but I have already tolle you my reasons why it cannot be an before y<sup>e</sup> first of Dec<sup>r</sup> It be straitened in point of y<sup>e</sup> m<sup>r</sup> I pray let me know by y<sup>e</sup> next y<sup>e</sup> post condition of m<sup>r</sup> Gards<sup>n</sup> Plantation where Capt<sup>t</sup> Munday did live & if any person hath it m<sup>r</sup> Anne Phipps is comeing over in this fleet to looke after her fath<sup>r</sup>s conerns and to assist his sister I believe it will seeme strange to you that y<sup>e</sup> d<sup>r</sup> of Monmouth is sent to y<sup>e</sup> Tower by order of y<sup>e</sup> House of Lords for vndutiful words spoken offyng w<sup>t</sup> a thing very unlikely when you were in London All that I dare to add at present is y<sup>e</sup> tender of my humble service to you who am
