Gentlemen / I have been favor'd wth a Letter of 2^d Inst & cannot escape you but I must assure you
they have been so tardy in their remittances - They appear to be very disengaged from all political
so as far as it relates to yo. In my last of 11th instant, mentioned that there w^{ld} be due to me from
Mess^r D. on 9th Oct^r a considerable sum of money infinitely more than sufficient to cover
Wildman's draft - That I was daily expecting remittance, but as they had not arrived presum-
ed they might not be received till after the Exchange of Leases had taken place - W^e Leases
were not sent out but I returned the latter end of Dec^r or beginning of Jan^r - Mr Forbes wrote
to me about a fortnight ago that he had received a letter from my Tenant at St Kitts in
Aug^r to me wrote to him in November - wherein he stated that he understood Mess^r D
only waited for execution of my Lease & concluded by expressing his regret at my being so
inconvenienced in business & hoped it w^{ld} be sent before receipt of his letter —

Thus stands & can at present I assure you no remittances have reached me & whenever
they do arrive they are ordered to be paid into your hands - from length of time
that has elapsed since leases were sent out it may fairly be supposed it will not
be a great while before we hear from West Indies - As I stated before my solicitor
Mr Forbes of this place will give you every information in his power relative
