Gentlemen

I have been favoured w<sup>th</sup> of Letter of 2<sup>nd</sup> Inst. & cannot exceptively Mess<sup>rs</sup> Dennis & Co. as  
sh<sup>d</sup> have been so tardy in their remittances - they appear so. it has been very distressing to me and painful  
so. as far as it relates to you. In my letter of 14<sup>th</sup> Inst. I certainly mentioned that there w<sup>d</sup> be due to me from  
Mess<sup>rs</sup> D. on 1<sup>st</sup> Dec. a considerable sum of money in payment more than sufficient to cover  
Widdowson's draft - that I was daily expecting remittances - but as they had not arrived presum-  
ed they might not be received till after the exchange of diseases had taken place - w<sup>ch</sup> I feared  
were not sent out (returned) till latter end of Dec. or beginning of Jan. - Mr Forbes wrote  
to me about a fortnight ago that he had received a letter from my Tenant at St. Kitts in  
ref<sup>er</sup> to one work to him in November - wherein he stated that he understood Mess<sup>rs</sup> D.  
only waited of execution of my Lease & concluded by expressing his regret at my becoming so  
inconvenienced in business & hoped it w<sup>d</sup> be settled before receipt of his letter -

Thus stands the case at present I assure you no remittance have reached me & whenever  
they do arrive they are ordered to be paid into your hands - from the length of time  
that has elapsed since I Leases were sent out it may fairly be supposed it will not  
be a great while before we hear from West Indies - As I stated before my Solicitor  
Mr Forbes of this Place will give you every information in their power relative  
to this business I have the honor to be Gentlemen
