Parish July 3. 1864

Dear Sister

I have been thinking of writing to you for a long time, but have not had the opportunity. I am alone this afternoon - and thought I could not make better use of the time than in writing to you. Triann and Hannah and the boys have gone to the school house to meeting. A Soldiers funeral sermon is to be preached ^{there} this afternoon. This is the fourth Soldiers funeral sermon that has been preached here since last fall. There was quite a number from this place joined the 110th regiment. I think there is not more than three left. This regiment was at New Orleans, and Port Hudson last summer, was ordered to Key West last winter, and are now lying off with the yellow fever.

We are all well as usual

James and Gould are cooopering to the Pitty came home last night. will go back tuesday

morning. I was over to Tenas's last sunday. They were all well there. Tenas is going to try his luck raising tobacco. He has got an acre. The plants were not all set when I was there. What were set looked first rate. They milk 6 cows. George has a quarter of an acre of tobacco. He thought that would be enough for him to try at first. They milk 6 cows there. It ^{has been very} ~~dry~~ here for a long time. Yesterday we had some rain, but not half enough. Grass will be light. Some commenced haying at Union Square last week.

"When will this war end. If it continues much longer I don't know but we will have as high prices here as they have had south. Last monday, flour was ten dollars a barrel. We have heard since it was fifteen. Last week cotton cloth ^{was} 75cts a yard, calico was 37cts spool thread 12cts, and other cotton goods according. Farmers will have to manufacture their own clothes. There will be considerable flax raised here this season. Priscilla bought 20 lbs of flax last spring. She has not got it all spun yet. Briann has been spinning some

Margaret - I talked some of coming to Ladrén's
this summer and staying til after hoppicking,
but I will have to give that up. I have more
sewing than I expected. have enough to keep
me busy all the time. I made six coats for
a clothing store in Mexico. carried them
~~them~~ back four weeks ago. The cloth was
half cotton, easy sewing. They paid me ^{eleven} shillings
a piece. They wanted I should ^{make} 6 more of
the same cloth. I could not stay long ~~enough~~
enough for the tailor to cut ~~to~~ ~~for~~
them. He said he would cut them and send
them to me. They have not come yet unless
they are to Tena's. If they come I cannot com-
mence sewing on them short of two weeks.
They said after July they would let me
have coats to make they could pay ~~afford to~~ ~~two~~
dollars and eighteen shillings a piece.
If I should not sew for that shop I may
come in August. I don't suppose you
and Alfred would come back with
me if I should come. When are you com-
ing here to make a visit. George says

write me all the news

*Since I commenced writing this letter I have heard of another soldier's death at
Stern West - Chancery, Gardner of this place. He died with the yellow fever.*

he is not coming there again until you come here. I have been looking for a letter from Willie a long time but there has not any come yet Frankie said in her last letter he was a going to write ~~soon~~ me another letter soon., Henry wants to know why Hammy does not write. He says he believes he wrote to him last. I suppose you have plenty to do now. How many cows do you milk this summer. How does your hop vines look. have you sold your last years hops.

Margaret what do you think about my selling my carpet for six shillings a yard. Anna wants to buy it if Heiram is willing. she wont know till fall. If Heiram makes up his mind to buy it I think I had better let them have it don't you, I dont know as I shall have a chance to dream on that wedding cake I suppose Anna has gone to keeping house. It is getting late and I must stop writing and bid you good night - hoping I may hear from you soon. Do not forget to write
