My dear wife,

Your very affec-

tioned letter dated the 4<sup>th</sup> inst

I duly received and thank you for

it. I <sup>am</sup> glad to hear that you

are doing well and all are in

good health. I am getting along

very well, just as good as can be

expected under such circumstances.

At present I am not able to ob-

tain a furlough and it would

not be prudent to ask for one.

I have to get entirely well first, as

our Dr is determined to have every

wounded man thoroughly treated, be-

fore granting him a furlough or

discharging him from the Hospital.

I am able to walk about and have  
been in town several times. Give  
my love to the children, to our  
folks, all our friends, and hope to  
see them all well as soon as I  
shall be able to obtain a furlough.

We have good many Amputation  
Cases in our Hospital, but every one  
is getting along nicely, only one  
death occurred since I came here.

Have you heard anything about  
my brother Charles? — and if  
he has been taken prisoner at  
the Wilderness.
