Dear Parents,

As it is but a few days since I wrote home, I will have but little to write now. Joe & I received a hearty welcome back, all seemed glad to have us return, in health; especially Gustavus. We found him quite well, with the exception of a little lameness, occasioned by marching, but he has since recovered from that. Found the Major quite sick, at a farm-house, about a mile east of our camp, where he had been some time, having a comfortable place, & being well cared for. He has now returned to camp, being nearly recovered, though not very strong yet. I took dinner, in company with the Chaplain, - Gustavus & Joe, at the house where the Major was staying. The day after our arrival - Mr. Calvin, & his family,

consisting of a wife & four daughters, entertained us very acceptably.— The people about here with several families of whom, I have become acquainted, live in a frugal way though they seem to be comfortably off, & treat the soldiers in a hospitable manner. Nearly, if not quite, all are strong in their expressions of sympathy for the Government, & the Union cause, & exceedingly desirous that the war shall be speedily brought to an end. All the property owners about here have suffered greatly <sup>in</sup> a pecuniary point of view, from the proximity of the armies. Rather than risk the destruction of crops, little appears to be raised this season.

Our march to Front Royal, & the hardships & exposures incident thereto, told sadly upon the health of our Reg. A great many were sick in consequence; about 20 are scattered in different hospitals, out of one Co. & of those who are left in the Co. a good

many have been wounded, but are now rapidly recovering. Our sleeping accommodations are quite rude - I have no blanket, except a rubber one, as my two wooden blankets & rubber coat were lost some time ago. The weather has been quite pleasant since I came, though we have had two pretty hard rain storms. - Our Co. was out on picket day before yesterday. I was with the most advanced picket, consisting of 9 men, a Sgt. & Corp. During the day a party of 17 of Shields men came along & passed beyond the lines, to go on a scout. At night 7 of them came back, reporting that they had seen the Rebel pickets three miles above. We were at Warrenton Junction, 2½ miles west of Catlett's. It has been since reported that the enemy are only 8 miles from here, which may or may not be true. - We are expecting marching orders all the time, having been

ordered to be in readiness to march  
an hour's notice. What our  
destination is to be, of course we  
do not know. I am very well,  
am pretty quite strong & rugged.  
Love to all - Good night.

As I write, a squad-  
ron of Cavalry - the 1st Mich. - is passing  
by, probably going towards Marcellus,  
as there are bands of Guerrilla Cavalry  
between here & there. - One of our  
boys who was off 8 or 10 miles from  
here, scouring the country, trying to cap-  
ture some stray horses, went within  
a short distance of a body of about  
40 - Guerrilla Cavalry, & narrowly es-  
caped being taken. We expect work  
pretty soon.
