Wherof we William Myddelton and Thomas Williams Esq: his Majesty's
Abonnen & Justice of the Peace of the said Borough of Doubrigh (in pursuance
of his said Majesty's Commaund signified to us by the Custos Rotulorum of the
County of Doubrigh) have caused George Williams, William Johnson and
Thomas Evans otherwise Edwards.

to be apprehended and conveyed before us Dit appearing to us that they
are Stragling Seamen and Seafaring Men fitt to serve in his said Majesty's
Sluys = Therefore we do hereby in his said Majesty's name strictly charge
and commaund you the above named John Roberts, William Foulke, Benjamin
Larry, and Foulke Myddelton immediately to conduct them the said George
Williams, William Johnson and Thomas Evans otherwise Edwards from the Town
of Doubrigh in the said Borough to the Commauder of any Ship, Sloop, or Sinder
belonging to his said Majesty at Chester, that so they may be putt on board
such of his said Majesty's Sluys or Slopells as are appointed to receive them
And we do hereby require the said Commauder of the Ship or Slopell (wherein
the said Stragling Seamen or Seafaring Men shall be putt) to Certifie the receipt
of them to the Collector or proper Officer of the Customs residing in Chester afo:
in order that they the said John Roberts, William Foulke, Benjamin Larry, &
Foulke Myddelton may be paid (by the said Collector or proper Officer of the said
Customs) as well the summe of Twenty Shillings for conducting each of the said Stragling
Seamen and Seafaring Men as also six pence a Mile for every Mile they
respectively travel And we do hereby Certifie that the distance from the Town
of Doubrigh afo: to Chester afo: is Twenty Miles by computation given under
our Hand and Seale at Doubrigh in the said Borough of Doubrigh the Eleventh
day of March One thousand seven hundred and fifty six.
