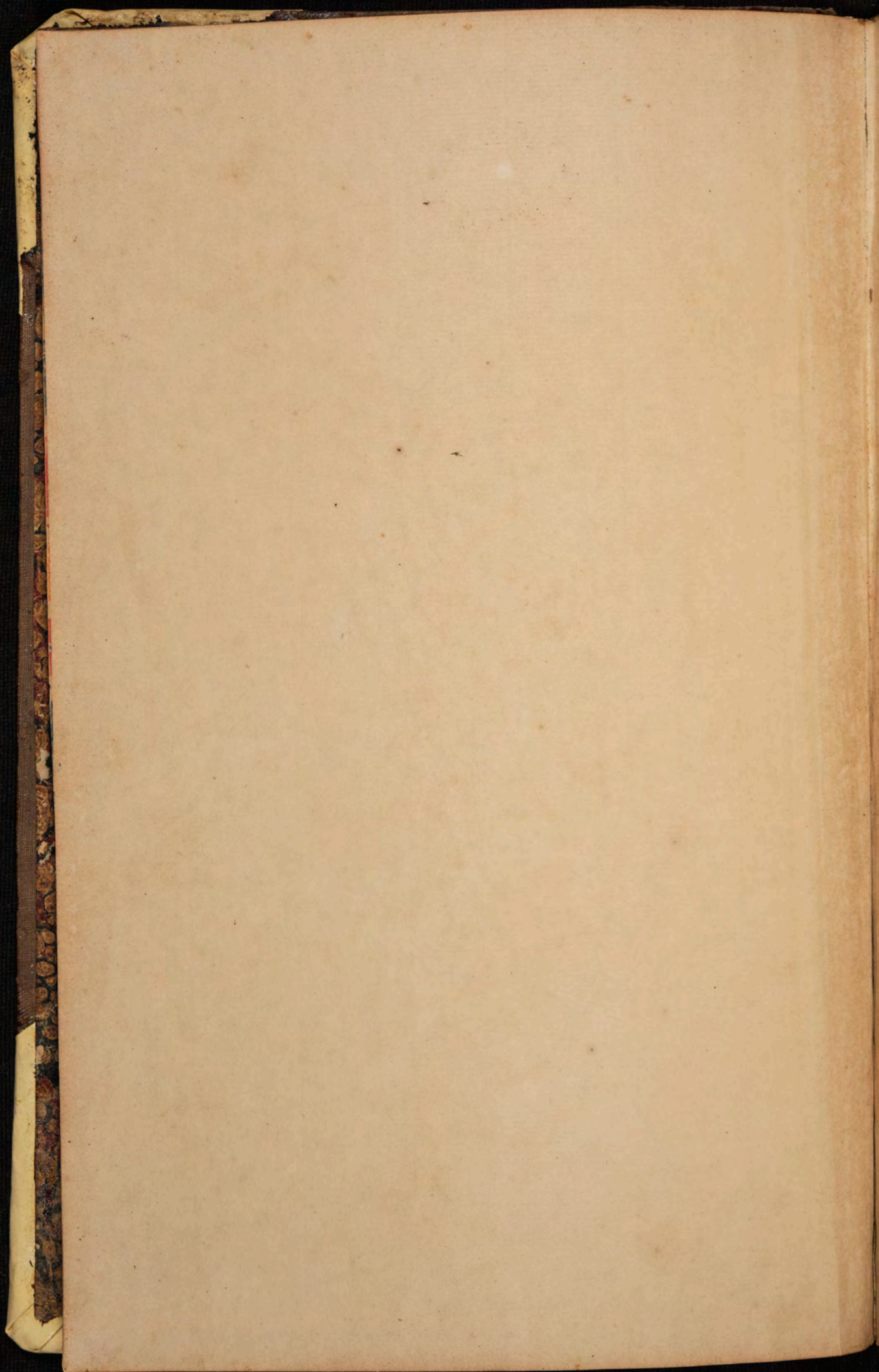

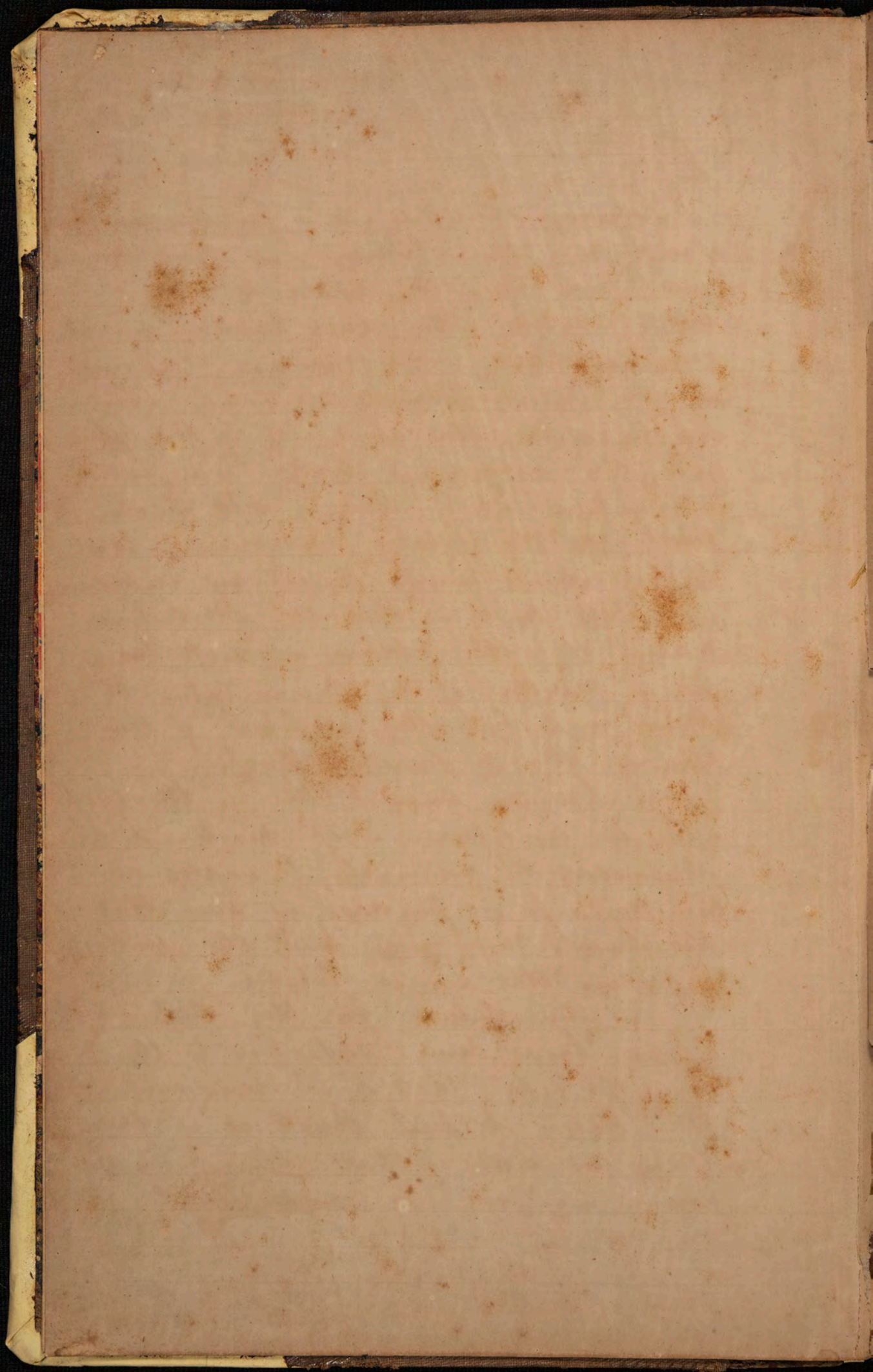

Sir.

Yesterday I visited Mr. [?] for the purpose of inspecting the Treasury in that Island and I now have the honor to report that I checked the cash balance, guineas & Savings Bank, the Postage, Revenue and Judicial Stamps to date, these together with the accounts of the Office and the subsidiary books were correct and up to date. No Excise visits to the Estates distilleries had however been made since my departure in July last, this Mr. M. Evelyn explains by the absence on sick leave for 4 months of the Excise Officer Mr. Morris and by the abolition of the Office of the 2 Landing Masters.

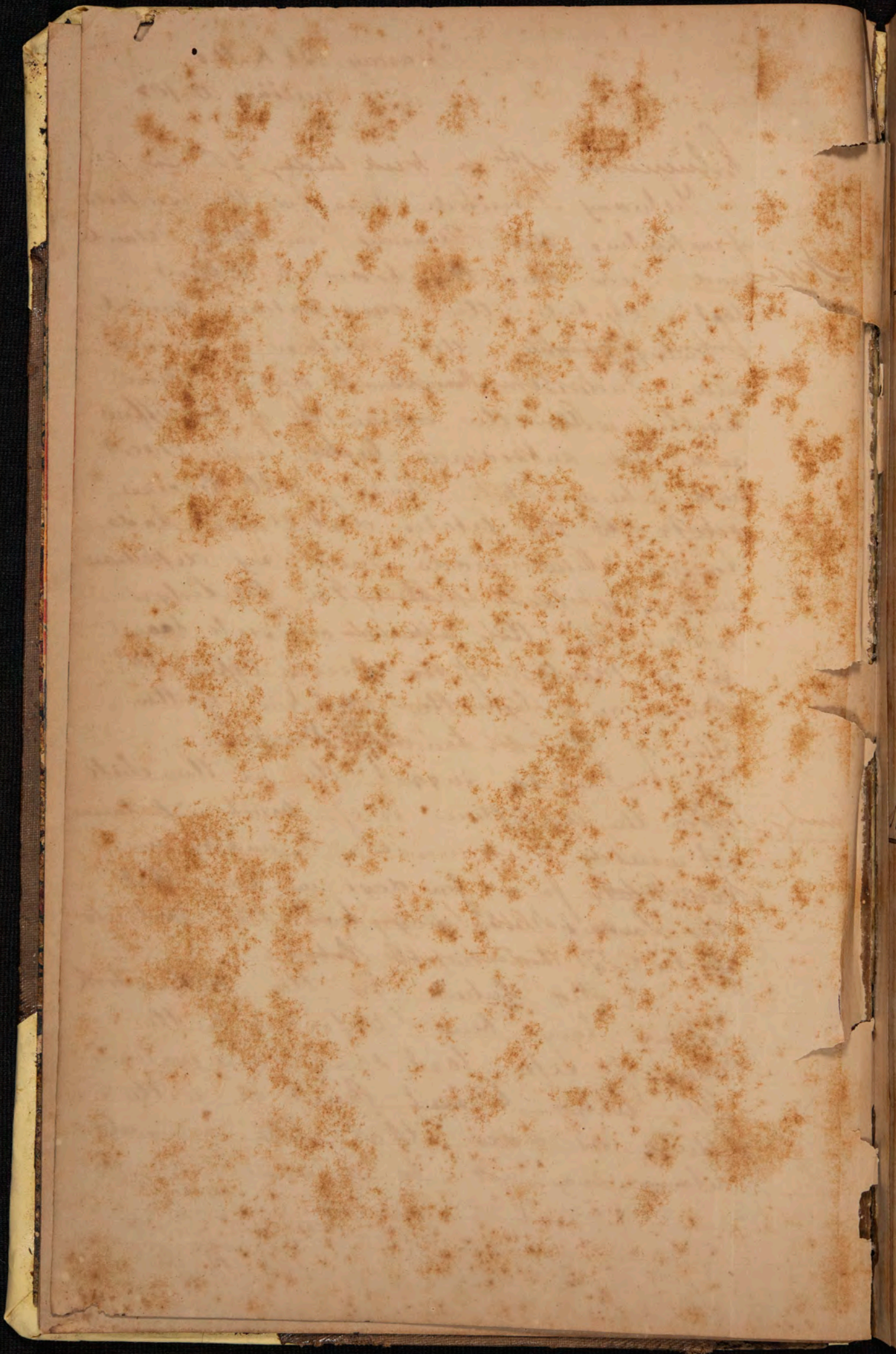
I would suggest that as the check upon the distilleries is of much importance it would be advisable to employ an Aid Master for a few days in order that the Landing Master may have the opportunity of making the usual visits.

The Entries for the Blue book returns have been perfected to the end of Sept. last & I have instructed Mr. Evelyn to push on with these in order that the annual returns may not be delayed.



I have the honor to forward a copy of the wharfage rates passed this day by the Legislative Council of the Presidency.

These dues are to be collected by the Treasury Department at the time that persons are paying Import or Export duties, and are to be enforced, not by the detention of the articles but by summary process before the Police Magistrate.

It is specially intended that no dues shall be levied upon goods sent coastwise, that is, shipped from one port in the Presidency to any other port or bay within the United Presidency of St. Christopher Nevis and Anguilla.

The rates having received the assent of the Council they are to be enforced as soon as this letter is received by you.

In reply to your letter of the 31<sup>st</sup> ultimo explaining the circumstances of your having left Sandy Point prior to the time for closing the Treasury at that Port, I would state that in future when occasion again requires you to be absent it will be necessary for you to inform me of such circumstances on the preceding day in order that I may be cognizant of your absence and also that I may be aware of the arrangements you propose for the performance of your duties during such times as you may feel obliged to absent yourself from your post.

On the last occasion of my being at Sandy Point I desired you to endorse the numbers of the Import & Export Warrants opposite the articles on the Inward & Outward manifests of vessels entering or leaving at your port, as the papers received by Post to-day have not been so endorsed, I return them in order that my instructions may be carried out.

At the time of my transmitting the Warrants for goods by Carriage I also instructed you to endorse on the back of these Warrants the receipt and particulars of goods landed at your Port, at the same time I desired you to return these papers as soon as they had been perfected. Up to the present date my instructions in this respect have not been complied with.

Sir,

I have the honor to forward for your guidance a copy of the Rules passed for the government of Public Wharves and Wharves in this Presidency, together with a schedule of the rates chargeable upon the importation or exportation of goods.

As these Rules and dues came into operation this morning at 10 o'clock it will be necessary for you to ascertain the amount of produce already shipped on board the "Morning Star" in order that you may be able in a position to collect dues upon the balance of cargo when the vessel is ready for sea.

Until I can get a printed copy of the Law I would state for your information that you are not to enforce the payment of these dues by the detention of the articles, but the Law provides for the collection of the tax by summary process before a Police Magistrate.

The practice I have adopted at this office is to calculate the amount of tax at the time the Importer is paying the Import or Export duties and to add this sum

In reply to your enquiries relative to Ordinance Nos 8 & 11, I have to state that the latter is in operation throughout the United Presidency of St. Kitts Nevis & Anguilla, Ordinance No 8 has also had its effect by repealing the laws enumerated in its Schedule.

As the Revenue officer stationed at the Road may not be sufficiently acquainted with the new Treasury Act I shall be obliged if you will direct him how to proceed with the prosecutions against the persons concerned in the case of smuggling reported by you. ~~Section~~

Section 19 confiscates the stuffs landed without permission, and in the event of no claim of ownership of the boat being served upon the Treasury within 14 days, Clause 34 provides for the forfeiture of the boat also.

I shall be glad to receive at as early a date as possible a Report of the particulars of this Seizure.

The amount for "Poor Relief" inserted in W 141 has not been received and as I notice that the amount is charged in Cash  $\text{£}$  for Sep<sup>r</sup>. I return the Warrant in order that it may be signed; stamps need not be affixed to receipts under L 2, that being the smallest sum liable to Stamp duty.
