




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N.Y. - Hamburg

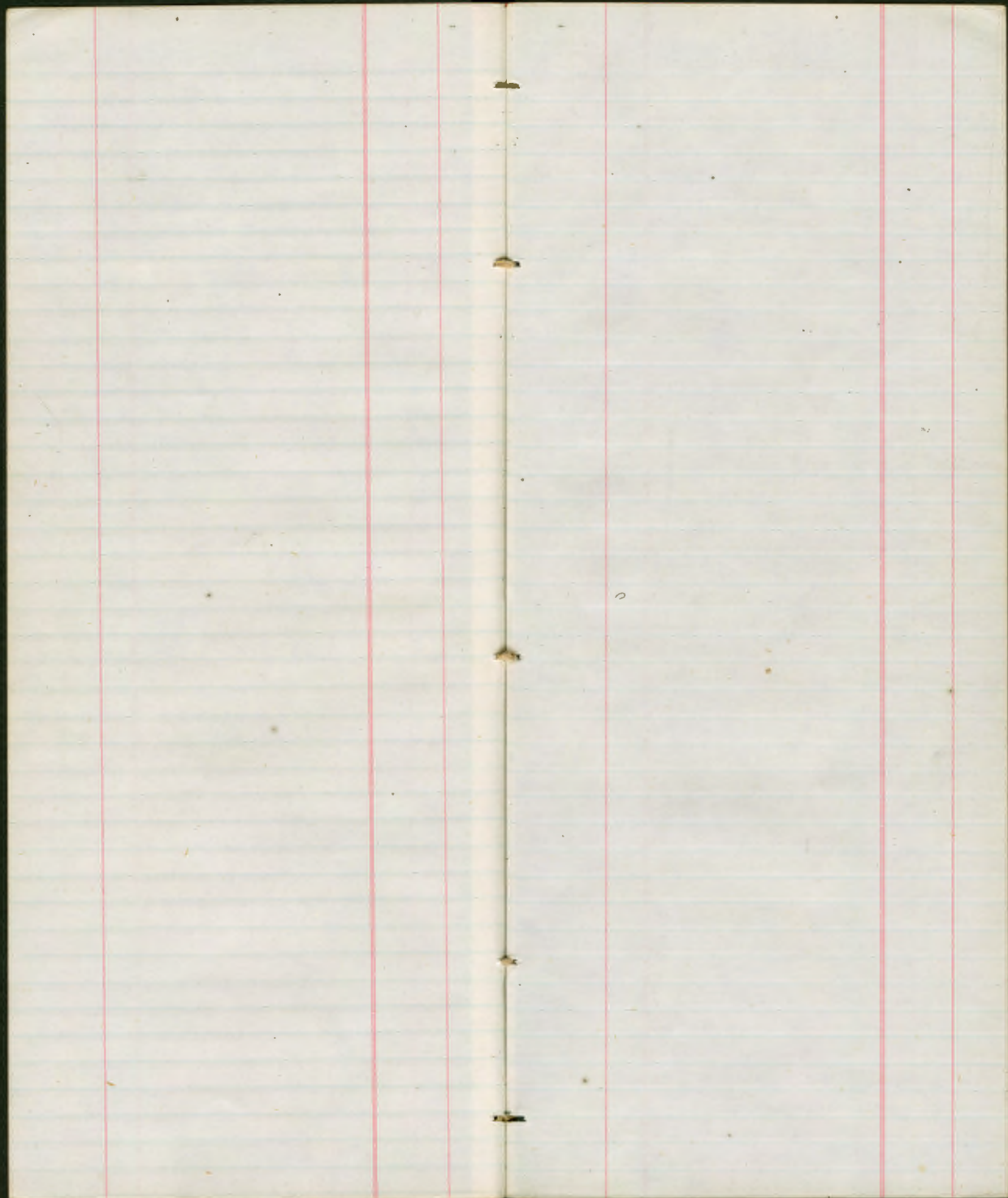

From Köln to Bonn in coach. Boat to Coblenz to Bingen. Stop over night & then by boat to Wiesbaden. Then by rail to Frankfurt.

To Hamburg & back to Baden - over night to Strasbourg over night. Then to Heidelberg & on here & in morning on - either to

June 21<sup>st</sup> - 1842.  
Saw New York for  
Hamburg. Sailed on  
the steamer Columbia from  
Hoboken at 3 o'clock P.M.  
should have sailed at  
2 o'clock but was obliged  
to wait for the mails -  
Ellie, Chaulet, Geo Strahan  
and I were over in a  
coach. Det. Strahan  
Berkley, Wm. Hastings +  
Frank were down to see  
us off. Sea very  
smooth - day charming -  
at 5 o'clock went  
down to dinner, finished  
same at 7 o'clock.  
Went on deck after  
dinner + saw the  
sunset. No clouds +

about night. Land very plain  
at bank below the horizon  
like a silk of dazzling  
gold. leaving the mountains  
of so splendors tinting  
all the sky round  
about. At 8 1/2 P.M.  
tea was served, but  
I prefer + bit of  
crockery + a glass of  
sherry.

About 50 <sup>100</sup> passengers I should say  
not counting children -  
not much to speak  
of. Know none of them.  
Mr. H. Strahan  
however a friend of the  
Watsons came forward  
+ introduced himself  
at dinner, + he intro-  
duced us in turn to a  
Mr. Miller + his cousin  
a young Mr. Walker -  
Retired at 10 o'clock.

June 20 - After 19 hours - 246  
nautical miles out.

Got up in the morning  
at 8 o'clock & went  
out to breakfast.

Slept quite well but  
coughed some & perspired  
much, Nellie slept well  
our dinner was open  
& in the early morn.  
Nellie had to up &  
shut it.

Nellie was out to  
breakfast but did  
not feel well. Has  
not felt well all  
day. He is quite  
bilious & cannot  
get sea-sick enough  
to feel relief. Still  
he has been up &

down all day,  
appearing at all meals  
for a little time &  
then disappearing.  
So we had a lunch  
at 1 P.M. making  
out our compliment of  
4 meals a day.

Passed a good part  
of the day on deck  
reading Rear's new  
novel. "Put yourself in his  
Place". The day has  
been beautiful & bright  
& the sea very smooth -  
It was rather fresh  
this morning & a  
heavy top coat not  
admiss -  
Sun set beautiful.

June 23-

June 22<sup>d</sup> - 23 Made  
302 Miles.

Day beautiful as yesterday  
the sea smoother than  
ever. Was on deck  
all day & sat in  
the sun & enjoyed it  
The reflection from the  
water burnt my face  
however quite a  
considerable & it now  
pains me some -  
Same routine as to  
meals - Belle has  
feel quite well all  
day & smoked &  
eaten in a regular  
manner.

There is a certain  
M. Halsted of the

Cincinnati Commercial  
on board. I don't like  
him much, neither a  
conscientious lawyer  
from the same town  
named Lincoln -  
I finished "Put yourself  
in his place" -



June 24 Friday -

June 23-24 distance  
30 1/2 miles - How so  
far used our sails  
scarcely at all,  
for the 11 time the  
sunset tonight was  
gorgeous & in the west  
being a rainbow.  
Learned the name of  
the gentleman who  
sits opposite me,  
Espersen from LaCrosse  
Wis. As a Dane & a  
clever fellow. Man  
at my right at  
table is named Partridge  
& is a very stout young  
plain business man,  
of little culture but  
much sense.

Little or chills wind  
all day, but still kept  
to the deck pretty well.  
A game of "Shuffleboard"  
was started to-day &  
caused some interest.  
Both of us feeling  
very well, but rather  
dumb.

In the evening no  
came out a little  
fog. And there  
being little comfort  
on deck, Carl in  
the cabin was the  
rage. Belle & I  
played a game or  
so of ricker.

June 24<sup>th</sup>

24-25. 299 miles.

Slept very sound & got up at 8 o'clock. Found weather rather unpleasant. Sea smooth but somewhat foggy. Saw several little fishing smacks from the banks. We are up to the Banks to-day but sail so far South that we shall not touch them.

Have passed most of the day in reading. Bonola & Ellie still feeling very well.

June 26<sup>th</sup> Sunday

From June 25-26 290

Day like yesterday. No fog, but cloudy & unpleasant on deck, so we all stay below most of the day either in the cabin or smoking room. I wrote quite a letter to-day to Mrs D. to send off at Plymouth. Last evening had a very pleasant time in the Surgeon's cabin talking German with him - Both feeling very well to-day - only I think we eat too much.

June 27<sup>th</sup> -

June 26-27<sup>th</sup> 295<sup>0</sup> miles -

Nothing new to-day.

Same sort of a day  
as yesterday + same  
routine -

June 28<sup>th</sup>

June 27<sup>th</sup> - 28<sup>th</sup> 312 miles -

Nothing new to-day.

There is a Mr. Wassermann  
on board from San Francisco  
who is a very interesting  
man though a Jew.

He travels with a wife  
& children under 14 years  
& 2 servants

June 29<sup>th</sup> -

June 28<sup>th</sup> - 29<sup>th</sup> 304 miles -

Nothing new as usual -

Sea smooth - Day quite  
pleasant, but the head  
wind a little too sharp  
for comfort on deck -

June 30<sup>th</sup> -

June 28<sup>th</sup> - 29 297 miles -

Quite a pleasant day  
in the afternoon but  
rain in the morning, 4<sup>th</sup>  
the first time in a week  
we have a favorable  
wind and all the  
canvas is set.

Saw a school of porpoises  
this afternoon, which for  
five minutes caused our  
momentary excitement -  
Kellie & I have both

been troubled with headache  
to day from some  
unknown cause.

Friday July 1st -

Day very pleasant but  
passed the morning  
in writing letters  
about 2 o'clock sighted  
the Scilly Islands &  
then sailed up along  
the coast of Devonshire  
to the harbor of  
Plymouth, which  
is very beautifully  
situated & governed  
by hills surrounded  
by fortifications -  
the green fields  
marked off by still  
green hedges

looks very beautiful  
in the evening low-  
light for it was  
after six when the  
little steaming tug came  
out to take off our  
London passengers -  
Painter of 343 B. way  
& Miller & Son of  
Union Square were  
all who left from  
our cabin - We are  
now steaming on to  
Cherbourg which we  
shall reach about  
2 or 3 o'clock to-morrow  
morning. Sent off  
letters home, to Charles  
& to the Donaldsons -  
Just about 2990 miles to  
Plymouth - Made it in  
10 days of Sandy Hook -

Saturday July 2<sup>nd</sup> -  
Reach Cherbourg at  
8. This morning  
I woke up & looked  
out of the port hole  
& got a glimpse of  
the great breakwater,  
Katie dressed & went  
on deck to see the  
passengers off for  
Paris. I did not  
think it safe for  
me -

Hilshant, Weber  
Halstead, Lincoln, Holth-  
mann Krober & some  
others then in all  
left our cabin.  
For the first time  
Katie & I did  
not get up to

breakfast, at about  
10 o'clock we were  
passing the white cliffs  
of Dover. We are now  
on the North Sea &  
to morrow late in the  
afternoon shall be  
on the Elbe.

The captain, (Haack) made his appearance  
day before yesterday  
he has been laid  
up in his cabin  
with a broken foot  
caused by a piece  
of iron fall upon  
it. He is a man  
quite small in  
stature but very  
pleasant & gentlemanly  
a Mrs Jaffris from  
Washington wife of

level, Fannies is on board  
with her daughters  
they are very pleasant  
people & know Minnie  
Sackett. They spoke  
of her as being much  
admired & told us  
that she was now  
rejoicing in the  
arrival of a little  
pupoose -

There is also a  
Miss Carrie Chatterbox  
on board, rather  
pleasant & not  
homely, is rather  
petite & quite well  
formed. As about  
30 I should say -  
As from Brooklyn  
she made the same

voyage that Mark  
Twain wrote his  
book about. -

A young fellow from  
Detroit named Geo Klein  
has hooked himself  
onto us & seems  
inclined to travel  
all over Germany  
with us he is a  
clever fellow & how  
we can shake him  
is a question.

Sunday July 3<sup>rd</sup>  
Our second Sunday  
was not awful &  
no one was all some-  
what uneasy, but had  
to reach Hamburg  
that night. About  
3 o'clock we came  
in sight of Heligoland  
and soon had left  
the North Sea & were  
on the bight. We  
went up the bight  
until about 9 o'clock  
and within 10 miles  
of Hamburg & there  
the tide was not  
high enough to take  
us over a certain  
sand bar - so we  
went tid down -

With much regret we  
had to make up our  
minds to pass another  
night on the steamer.

Monday July 4<sup>th</sup>  
The vessel started off  
about 5 o'clock in  
the morning & we  
reached Hamburg about  
7. I got over to St. Peter's  
Hank on the lower  
quayside about 8 o'clock  
The day is thus far  
very pleasant. Yesterday  
the sea was rougher  
than at any time  
during our voyage  
although not very  
rough at that but  
I had a little  
headache to begin

with + the motion  
made it worse so  
that I do not feel  
my brilliant to-day  
By the way one  
of the excitement  
on board the boat  
was that one of  
stewards who acted  
as our Cabin boy  
drank like a fish  
& drank every day  
since he could lay  
his lips out; he  
stole my wine & I  
complained of him -  
He will have to  
go by the board I  
reckon -

Rest in my room  
until now, while

Kellie & young Kain  
went out + took a walk.  
at 10'clock we had  
a locust & a fine  
dinner it was too.  
after dinner went  
to zoological garden.  
Had a delightful  
stroll for about three  
hours there. The Aquarium  
is a perfect wonder -  
after return from the  
garden went over &  
took a little something  
to eat at the Alster  
Pavilion which is  
built right over  
the Alster. Rested  
in the evening & went  
to bed early.



Tuesday July 14<sup>th</sup> - Berlin  
Got up about 9 o'clock +  
after coffee Billie + I  
took a walk to look  
at some of the famous  
shops on the Wall +  
elsewhere, at 3 P.M.

we took the Cornier  
train for Berlin +  
reached there about  
9/12 by 10 o'clock we  
were located in the  
Hotel d. Angletours -

The journey was a  
quick + a comfort-  
able one. I had a  
little touch of chills +  
fever, but in as much  
as I had most of  
the coupe to myself  
I could lie down

and rest very well -  
Our rooms at the  
hotel is large +  
pleasant + we shall  
probably live a few  
days in it.

Wednesday Jul. 15<sup>th</sup>  
Got up about 9 o'clock  
+ had a good breakfast  
then went to the  
bankers in the Burgstr.  
+ then to Asher +  
bought some guide  
books, after this we  
took a Droschke +  
drove to St. Bonien  
Str. where we found  
Tommy G. in his German  
home. Dr. Hartkamp -  
Tommy says his health  
is not at all good

and that he cannot  
study. Dr. Harkway  
gave me a prescription  
for my child. &  
then we left & went  
for a little lunch  
after returning to  
hotel rested the  
table & note at  
4 P.M. & a waitress =  
our dinner it was  
worse than on the  
boat. After dinner  
Tomkins & Belle  
went to the theatre  
I preferred to stay  
in my room.  
Notice a young  
lady at dinner whose  
face looked natural  
to me but I could

not recall her name.  
I looked on the book  
and found it was  
a Miss Moulton from  
Albany. a friend of  
Minnie Williams. I  
have just sent round  
my card & as I  
have heard nothing  
from it perhaps she  
don't know me.  
Very Well. Give  
& love -  
Monday Jul. 4<sup>th</sup>  
The young lady was  
out & left early  
this morning hence  
did not see her.  
In the evening went  
to Bodmans to see  
his minerals. found

that he was dead but  
his son still keeps  
up the business in  
the Bonniers Platz. I  
bought a few pseudo-  
morphs from him -  
on my return Belle  
& I drove out to  
Charlottenburg to see  
the Mausoleum.

After dinner Belle  
& Tommy went to  
Hofes. While I after  
walking an hour  
or so drove off  
to find the trichers  
found them moved  
to No 130 Dresden Str  
in the new part of  
Berlin. They were all  
employed to see me  
& I spent a pleasant  
hour there.

Friday, July 8  
My night sweats  
wreaked me & my  
chills continue.  
In the morning went  
to a tailor on  
the Bismarck, Belle got  
dress suit for 3  
& I a fine pair of  
trousers for  
10 1/2.

After this took a cab  
& drove out to Muhlberg  
& saw Borries green-  
houses & grounds,  
the day being splendid  
We saw every thing  
to the best advantage  
In the evening Belle  
& Tommy went to  
Tegel with  
Mrs Harris. I went  
& called at the

Abbots, Dr. Abbott  
was out of town &  
Mr. Fay not at home  
then called on  
Prof. Peters -

Saturday July 9

In the morning walked  
over to the German  
Institut - Kurfürst Straße  
& called on Prof.  
Rammelsberg - found  
him in his private  
lab. at work - he  
was very polite -  
After dinner drove  
to No. 2 Thiergarten  
Str. & had an  
interview with Dr.  
Krause - then came  
back & went to  
aquarium where -

found Belle & <sup>young</sup> Tommy  
& the Harris -  
This aquarium is  
very large & is  
combined with an  
arsenal & a manufactory  
but for sea does  
not compare with  
the much smaller  
one at Hamburg -

Sunday 10<sup>th</sup>

Very chilly, quite  
chilly this morning  
so stay at home  
while Belle went  
to the Am. Chapel,  
at 1.0'clock went  
up to Dr. Hartung  
& he gave me some  
new medicine -  
Young Dr. Bull -

Harry's brother Sam  
with us to day -  
seems a fine fellow  
is staying here -

On the evening  
at 8:30 we went  
over to the University  
& took tea with  
Prof. Peters w. some  
others, had a nice  
meal tea good -  
mint good -

Monday, Jul, 11<sup>th</sup>

at 10 o'clock Bellie  
took a quick &  
went to Peters.  
While I went and  
introduced Bellie  
into his new work-  
ing hour I found  
for him.

From Krissmann 35<sup>3</sup>  
Schöngew Str. They  
drove over to the  
new laboratory  
in the Georgen Str.  
First man I met  
was young Smith -  
saw Prof. S. coming  
out of Hoffmann's  
lab. Found Hoffmann  
in his house he was  
obliged to leave but  
introduced me to one  
of his assistants who  
was very polite &  
showed me the  
whole of the immense  
institution. The  
lab room was  
250. Prof. Dr.  
Bellie shows an old  
print of mine in it

At 7:30 went over  
to the Berg Academy  
& attended a meeting  
of the Berlin Chemische  
Gesellschaft. Rammelsberg  
was in the chair &  
he came forward  
& asked me to  
write my names  
in their book -  
Hoffmann was  
there & as Prof.  
Miller's assistant  
might have been  
to present -  
I met a man at Hart  
Stewart's Show  
at a fair next  
of some 4 or 5 of  
them in the 50 range  
after the meeting

The Combs, but if  
asked me to go  
& drink some beer &  
I did so with about  
20 other chemists -  
Among others was  
introduced to Dr Kraus  
Baker's friend & one  
of Hoffmann's assistants  
The Society name was -

Sunday Jul. 18<sup>th</sup>

Very warm day -  
Very much from 80 -  
90 in the shade  
I kept going  
day. After  
Went & looked at some  
photographs at the Plat-  
tensberg. Then went  
& drank some beer  
Went to bed early -

Wednesday July 13<sup>th</sup>

Staid in my room during the morning. At 2 P.M. Went over to the Mineral Cabinet with Ellie - and took <sup>that</sup> <sup>big</sup> 300 white spots in my hand. After dinner I received a call from Prof. Egerton.

Thursday Jul. 14<sup>th</sup>

Weather still warm + bright - have not done much to-day. Drove up to Money Brothers in the afternoon + looked at his minerals again. After dinner wrote a week of about 2 hrs all by myself -

Friday July 15<sup>th</sup>

Bought some photographs of Duesas in the morning had a bad chill about 11 o'clock + staid in my room the remainder of the day. After dinner drove out to Siroli + Housburg Saturday Jul. 16.

In the morning went over to Museum + spent a couple of hours looking at the paintings I admire most. At 2 P.M. Went to Dr. Hartung, who presented to me what I wanted + now I am well supplied with efficient medicine. In the evening went to Housburg garden - + heard Williams

Met Tommy Thib-

Sunday July 17<sup>th</sup>

Woke up at 5 A.M.  
Drank some coffee  
& at 6:30 left  
for Dresden, reaching  
there at 12 M.

Drove to Hotel Ballmann  
just over the border  
in the act. &  
overlooking the river.  
We had a good  
dinner & having  
a good room  
went up to it  
& rested. Took a

ride on Buhl's  
over to the Ballmann  
had some music late to  
some more dinner & coffee

War

Friday about 10 o'clock  
just as we had  
finished dinner the  
bad news commenced  
to circulate that  
France had declared  
war against <sup>Prussia</sup>  
<sup>at 2 P.M. Friday</sup>  
of several days  
the public mind  
had been very much  
agitated upon the  
subject but no one  
dreamed that any  
such sudden attack  
Bismarck arrived in  
Paris Friday &  
the King leaving  
Paris on special  
train reached here  
about 8 P.M. On



immense crowd of people  
blocking the Mukor road  
between from the B.  
thor to the Royal Palace  
There must have been  
more than 100,000  
people assembled to  
crowd a street for  
1/2 a mile which  
is 250 ft broad.

Finally the King &  
his suite came walking  
through the mighty  
mass of loyal subjects  
amid their tremendous  
huzzas. He came  
out after his arrival  
on the side balcony  
of his palace, several  
times & bowed to the  
people. As Willie & I

were very near by, we  
had a good view of  
him. Troops were  
moving towards the  
frontier & everything  
connected with the  
war department is in  
activity. Hope France  
will get thrashed!

---

Dresden Monday Jul. 18<sup>th</sup>

Ellie went right over  
to the Paintings - only  
a step from our  
hotel while I brought  
my daily child out  
about 2 P.M. I went  
over & looked at all  
my old favorites -  
After dinner at 1/2  
we took a comfortable  
Carriage & drove for  
two hours through all  
the principal & elegant  
streets of the town &  
also through the fine  
royal parks called  
the "Grosser Garten" -  
Met Max Weinmann in  
the street. Was some  
21 years ago in my

Job. in N.Y. He  
should be in Leipzig  
but says he lives in  
Dresden. Also met  
Kerestow & his wife  
in the garden but  
they did not see  
us.

Tuesday Jul 19.

In the morning went  
out with Ellie to  
Ernst Arnold on  
the Schloss Str. where  
he bought some  
fine photographs  
by Bruckmann.  
After my child  
about 2 P.M. I  
got into a carriage  
& started to find

Mrs Sedgwick address  
to Herr Bauck who  
could give me her  
place of abode near  
Mick zw finden. Luis  
in the summer about  
5 miles out of town  
at Blagowitz. So I  
told my man to drive  
out there. Had a  
very pleasant drive &  
after finding where  
Herr Bauck lived, went  
in & found both him,  
his wife & Anna L -  
all at the table  
just through dinner -

Wednesday Jul. 20<sup>th</sup>  
Took the 9.10 A.M. train  
for Joriburg & after a  
pleasant ride of 1 1/2 hrs  
reached the famous town.  
Got into some sort of  
a coach & drove to  
Hotel de Saxe -

I sat down & had my  
chill while talking went  
for a stroll. About  
2 P.M., DeLafayette of  
J.Y., an old scholar  
& mine came in  
to see me. I then  
went with him to  
find Prof. Richter, who  
was at his house  
quite but in a  
hurry. Might be a  
very jolly fellow -

From thence I went  
over to the Mineral  
Comptoir in the  
Berg Academie. The  
collection is fine & the  
minerals exceedingly  
cheap. A gentleman  
the manager of the  
was sent with me  
through the Min. Coll.  
It contains some  
splendid specimens from  
Saxony & Bohemia in  
general.

Met "old" Hammerus  
at the Comptoir -  
I selected quite a  
lot of minerals -

Thursday Jul. 21

In the morning went  
over to the Comptoir  
and spent the whole  
forenoon there going  
out when tired & drinking  
a glass of beer with  
Hammerus. Kellie went  
off with Delafield to  
the Kupfers Mine -  
He told the hotel  
master to have a hack  
ready to take us to  
the 2 o'clock train  
back to Dresden. We  
finished our dinner  
& it was time to  
go but no hack -  
Master had made  
some mistake. But  
a hack was

Some talks about the  
trains being taken off  
next day for the  
troops. We rushed  
along to the depot  
on foot. I was very  
lucky, but kept quiet  
after we reached Berlin  
& came out all

straight.  
Met Backman and  
others in school & mine  
Friday Jul 22

intended to start for  
Frankfurt early in the  
morning but heard  
last night that it  
was almost impossible  
to get through. That  
everybody was leaving  
the Rhine that could  
be done all secret etc.  
Such being the case

We of course gave up  
our proposed trip.

In the morning we  
visited the Green Bank.

Sunday Jul 24

a Harr ~~for~~<sup>the</sup>  
Universal dealer but  
he was not at home  
We then drove through  
the Jews quarter of  
whom there are some  
10,000 in Prague.  
The streets are so  
narrow that a carriage

but as we sat Kellie  
could often touch the

the one side & I on

Bohemia & Moravia  
into Austria charming

We passed quite near  
Königsgrätz in Bohemia

by the station Wagram.

We bought a few things  
there - It was quite  
damp + raining all  
day. So we had  
no good view of

near having a  
chill. In the  
afternoon our room  
was changed + we  
now have a fine

is fine, + the  
meals fine -

Friday Aug. 12<sup>th</sup>

& into dining to the  
steamer "Bataillon" - &  
slept on board.

Friday Aug 26<sup>th</sup>

Sailed about 8 o'clock  
A.M. We were on  
a fine steamer  
not so very fast but  
a very smooth sailer  
Our state room is large  
& in a good position  
& all able to be about  
during the day -

& Victor Manger - who

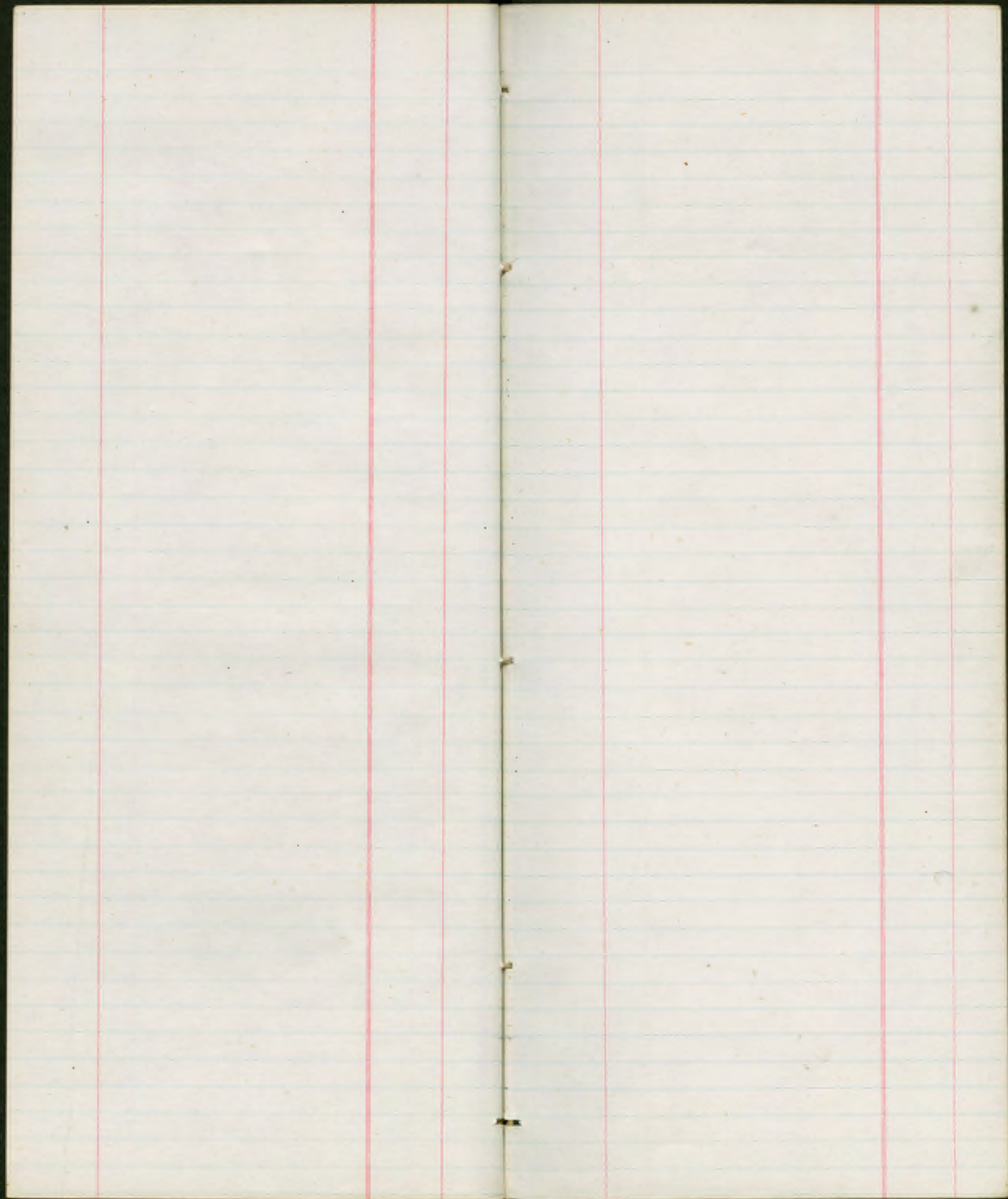
