Dear Sir,

We have this day been favored with your letter of the 29th Ult: enclosing General Jeffersons receipt for Mr. Tyrons. sent to Mess^{rs} Dennistoun & Co. - but we are sorry to be under the necessity of returning it on account of its informality in the Execution which the Agent of Mess^{rs} Dennistouns at once discovered & would not allow it to pass. We have corrected it therefore - accordingly and hope the forms will be minutely attended to so as farthor trouble may be prevented. They wish the receipt written in the Generals own hand writing and the names & designations of the witnesses (who must be both males above fourteen years of age) will require to be inserted in the body - of the deed and the witnesses will afterwards subscribe their own names each adding in his own hand the word "Witness" as corrected in the enclosed. General Jefferson too in subscribing his name will take care not to allow it to be touched by the underscore which he usually makes, because an objection was made to the present one being deleted.

We are very sorry indeed for the trouble and delay these

informalities have occasioned, but the same could not be avoided as the money could scarcely indeed be demanded without a new receipt executed in the proper way. From your saying nothing about the Interest on the bygone cents we of course presume none is to be demanded.
