

Dear Sir,

I have this morning seen Mr. Wildman and learn that he has only received 36 hds of the sugars, and he believes the remainder have been sent to Messrs. Demmestons by Mr. Tyson.

I met a gentleman there, who did not give me a favourable representation of Mr. Tyson's means, and from which I collected that his wish to retain the crop in question, arises, from his not being able conveniently to pay for it.

The Balance of Mr. Wildman's account appears to be about £1000 which, I fear, you will be under the necessity of providing for, long before you can obtain from Mr. Tyson & his consignees the amount of the produce of the crop, as if Messrs. Demmestons have received it from Mr. Tyson they will not feel authorized to account to you for the amount without his directions, and it will be necessary therefore to write fully to Mr. Tyson,
