

It will be in the range of your duties to keep the records of the regiment, to attend to the public official correspondence, to receive, receive, (when necessary,) and present to the commander of the regiment, all reports of company officers, and to supervise, generally under the direction of the colonel, the affairs of the regiment.

All orders issued, in course, (not necessarily,) through you, when charged with <sup>seeing to</sup> their execution, or to report if they are not executed. You are Chief of the Staff (not including colonel, Lieut Col, & Adj. vrs.) your rank, I believe, that of Lieutenant, and your pay, that of Captain, \$60 a month, besides \$8 a month, for forage for your horses. You furnish, I believe, your own horse, your arms, and your horse equipments, ~~and yourself~~ <sup>and yourself</sup>. It would be well to make your salary as pleasant as possible.
