Boston Oct. 16. 1782

to the Major the letter which you last

Fleet departs, I shall be again master of
the business, & I hope free from those who

justice depend upon facthood

You say nothing to me
respecting the Peas & Beans, I suspect
that a Mr. Sabonidee is purchasing
of them in your state, if so, his inter-
cepting this commission will prove
very disagreeable, pray if possible
procure the quantity I have asked.
