

# Instructions for M<sup>r</sup>. P. Carriek

1. M<sup>r</sup>. Carriek is directed immediately upon his Arrival at Granada, to look over the Inventories of every thing on the Estate to see that nothing has been embezzled since his leaving the Island. To call in all Acc<sup>ts</sup>. & to settle with M<sup>r</sup>. Graham all intrusions that may have occurred since your departure - in doing this to the satisfaction of both parties you had best call in the assistance of the other Gentlemen, (Attornies)
2. <sup>dy</sup> Let the Store Room be kept under a proper direction by a regular list of its Contents made out & often look'd over - By this means you will always be able to judge what things are necessary to be Commissioned from England - & you will the more easily detect the ~~store~~ embezzlings
3. <sup>dy</sup> Let Acc<sup>ts</sup>. of the Estate be regularly sent home at least every three months - & a state of the Negroes ~~from~~ Cattle Stores & every thing relating to Sugar &c. should be sent home transmitted to London every Month
4. <sup>dy</sup> Let nothing be bought upon the Island at a high price that can be Commissioned from England. M<sup>r</sup>. Carriek will be best judge of this upon the spot - Gen<sup>l</sup>. Grant need not tell M<sup>r</sup>. Carriek that he wishes every sort of attention may be paid to the Negroes to see that they are well cloth'd, well lodg'd, & when sick, not neglected by whom ever of - To see that the surgeon visits them twice a day, & often if necessity shall require it by this management they will with greater pleasure do their business when well
5. <sup>dy</sup> As the Estates are now divided - M<sup>r</sup>. Carriek must avoid making Acc<sup>ts</sup>. - Let a new state of the outstanding Debts after the turn of this year has been fold be sent over immediately



6<sup>thly</sup> As the Produce of the Estates go into one fund till such time as all the installments are paid up; Let the Gen<sup>l</sup> half of the Produce be assigned to - who will send compare Bills of sale with Mess<sup>rs</sup> Rogues that every thing may be equal

7<sup>thly</sup> Mr. Carrick after receiving the proper Vouchers which Mr. Atkinson is to send him when obtained from Mr. Sedgwick is desired to take the proper steps to recover that Account made by Mrs. Stone on Hugh Gram's Acco. which will go into the joint Acco.

8<sup>thly</sup> Mr. Carrick will please desire Mr. Graham to look over the Books a Copy of which he has including all Invoices & point out the things commisioned for his own use which are not brought into the Acco. carried out with you - some of which the Gen<sup>l</sup> imagine Mr. Graham never intended bringing into the joint Acco.

9<sup>thly</sup> Try to obtain every kind of information from Mademoiselle relative to the process between Mad. Moreau & Mrs. Douglass regarding the disputed Land - whether a Decision has been given & in what manner that the money agreed upon should be reimbursed may be recovered from one or other of them & whether they or their heirs now reside. Let a particular & distinct detail of this be transmitted

10<sup>thly</sup> The Gen<sup>l</sup> will not pretend to give Mr. Carrick particular instructions as to the carrying on the Improvements on the Estate he having entire confidence in Mr. Carrick's judgement Ability & Integrity supposes that he will do every thing for the best - He will only in general recommend that the improvements may be carried on by degrees & as the produce can admit of - this he presumes to be the most and the most effectual method of proceeding



11<sup>th</sup> Mr. Carrick, by the Auto. carried out with him that Mr. Graham  
owes Gen. Greene a Bal<sup>ce</sup> of £900 - exclusive of £500. Years  
Interest due & D. for which it is hoped that Mr. Graham will  
have no objection to give an Assignment to the Rent of the Carriacou  
Estate till such time as that Debt is paid up - ~~And that~~  
~~it is no more than what <sup>prudence</sup> requires of Gen. Greene & that~~  
~~justice dictates in Mr. Graham~~ As Gen. Greene is bound for  
the £500 to S. Laurence Dundup for which he has a back  
Bond from Mr. Graham notwithstanding Gen. Greene is of opinion  
that Mr. Graham ought to give him a Mortgage upon the sugar  
Estate in Grenada & Cotton Estate at Carriacou. In demanding  
this security it is hoped nothing will appear unreasonable, as it is  
no more than <sup>what</sup> prudence requires in Gen. Greene & what justice ought  
to dictate to Mr. Graham.

There is nothing Gen. Greene wishes so much as to see ~~things~~ every  
thing amicably settled between him & Mr. Graham & he flatters him-  
self that Mr. Graham is of the same Opinion. In that case there will  
be no compulsion necessary - I shall now conclude with entreating  
that Mr. Carrick will exert himself in the Execution of every thing here  
recommended - ~~and~~ to write home by every opportunity what  
is doing - ~~what~~ done & what proposed to be done on the Estate  
In that case Gen. Greene will be enabled to give such instructions  
he may think necessary.
