I was favored ^{re} your letter of the 20th Inst & have waited in daily expectation of receiving information of Mr Forbes having paid to you the money therein alluded to - As he wrote to me on 16th that he had received drafts from Glasgow w^{ch} had been accepted & which he proposed to endorse & send to my order - I replied to him on 19th & requested after he had satisfied some trifling charges against me that he w^d pay the balance to you to be placed to my account. Not having heard from him since that he either did not receive my letter or that he waits till the bills become payable, before he remits the money to you - but what his reasons are I know not - The Drafts were drawn on Smith, Payne & Smith One for £2997. 14. 3 the other for 599. 11. dated 10th Apr^l at 20 days - I merely give you this information to exonerate myself from any neglect or inattention, and to enable you to make such Enquiries into the Business as you may deem necessary I have the honor to be
