

Dear Mr. Scoble

I am very ill, too ill indeed to write - but yet I write to tell you that I received your letter, and am greatly obliged to you for your communications relative to a French Commissioner being in London and hope to hear more about it. A week ago Joseph John Gurney applied to me for a letter of Introduction to Monsieur Guizot, he and Joseph Royster being about to set off for Paris, to have an Interview with Mr Guizot, in order to inform him of the Results of Emancipation in the West Indies, as an Eye Witness. I have heard nothing from him since - but wish to know from you or J Beaumont, from whom I received a Letter this morning whether they are gone to Paris, or are still in London - Has or you may tell me, when you answer this Question, whether Joseph Sturge has received my Letters authorizing him to make the Corrections ^{in my late Pamphlet} which he himself desired - Either J. Sturge has not mentioned this, or J. Beaumont has forgotten to mention it - Pray let me have an answer to these two Questions - I am too ill to write more
