

Cap<sup>t</sup>: Matthew

London Decemb<sup>r</sup>: 1695

No<sup>t</sup> of y<sup>e</sup> 21<sup>st</sup> of June last with y<sup>e</sup> inclosed from Capt. Burroll  
Received yesterday togoather with y<sup>e</sup> copy of the same date  
& contents for which I return you thanks. And in answer  
thereto I must say that I approve and worry much esteem  
y<sup>e</sup> Person you nominate, and am sorry that I cannot say so  
much of his proposals w<sup>ch</sup> come farr short of my expectation  
The bare land without house or slave was let for a hundred  
pound Sterling secured to be payed in London: which the rent  
now offered will no wayes counteract besides that nothing  
is reckoned for my slaves nor for y<sup>e</sup> provisions or fares that  
are or may be growing when y<sup>e</sup> lesse should enter. And more  
over the Ruines of my houses & works are valuable in regard  
of y<sup>e</sup> Materialls they will furnish for new buildings for I  
well remember y<sup>e</sup> trouble and charge of bringing stones togea  
ther for such uses. And if Spouts to convey y<sup>e</sup> Water cannot  
be much ruined which cost me a considerable summe  
of Sugar w<sup>ch</sup> alltogether considered makes me hope my  
Plantation may deserve a farre better Rent than  
what is offered by y<sup>e</sup> first Article; the second is very  
hard upon me proposing y<sup>e</sup> at y<sup>e</sup> Expiration of the  
Terms of y<sup>e</sup> lease I should allow for y<sup>e</sup> sugar works or  
other buildings w<sup>ch</sup> y<sup>e</sup> lessor for his use or convenience  
shall erect, w<sup>ch</sup> according to such Appraisements as I have  
seen may swallow many yeares rent at one Gulp or  
yeo done I have reason to be cautious of such an Article  
least it should bring me in Debt in y<sup>e</sup> end Moreover it  
is not practicable & has scars and Trident in my  
knowledge or remembrance nor have I heard of such an  
one as y<sup>e</sup> third to allow four Moneths before y<sup>e</sup> obligation  
of y<sup>e</sup> lesse commences for what reason I cannot tell  
but, can easly foresee y<sup>e</sup> disadvantages that may  
accrue to a lessor upon such an unusuall concessions  
The fourth will admitt of little dispute but y<sup>e</sup> fifth is as  
severe as y<sup>e</sup> second for as y<sup>e</sup> word Meliorations formerly  
devoured many a fair Plantation so now the word --  
Improvements w<sup>ch</sup> is of y<sup>e</sup> same nature soones ready to  
make a prey of me at y<sup>e</sup> expiration of the Terms  
Not that I think Capt. Burroll would be aijest but he is  
mortall as well as I and not knowe a into what hand

I may fall it behooves me to provide for if worst as every body does in  
yo: like case. As to yo: Sixth Article y<sup>e</sup> seruantes are good if in England  
for a seruante there is not comparable to one in the plante I live in  
yet that Objection would soon be removed upon y<sup>e</sup> consideration of  
y<sup>e</sup> credit & InTEGRITY of y<sup>e</sup> Principall. The seventh I shoule agree to  
with some p[er]mitting for the exception at make with some part a t[er]m  
a latitudo sufficient to receive my whole rent when it is made  
liable to Dafalcations upon every Misfortune of Warre. I think it  
is enough for me to run y<sup>e</sup> risque of my rent upon the sea and not  
upon y<sup>e</sup> land before it is made mads by payment to me or my order  
as by the sayd Article is provided. Thus I have showed you my  
opinion of y<sup>e</sup> Proposalls and of y<sup>e</sup> o[ur] that I thinke might be made  
of them not that I suppose Capt. Burroll would take his advantages  
to the Rigour but it behoves me to act cautiouly & securely in a  
Domes of thi[n] nature and I hope my Maneresse in thi[n] Matter will  
not be misconstrued or ill taken  
S<sup>r</sup> my Inclynations as to y<sup>e</sup> renting my Plantation are not altered in  
in y<sup>e</sup> least but I would not nor never designed to put my Interest out  
of my hands & out of my power of ro[un]ding it for little or no  
profit nor would you I thinke advise me to it I would accept of  
a reasonable rent upon reasonable conditions as in my opinion  
those offered are not on my side by any means I pray give my  
humble service to Capt. Burroll and his lady & tell him I hope he will  
not except I should condonse to such conditions as are not  
Customary nor usuall in y<sup>e</sup> like cases which would be a refutation on  
my judgment should I shew to things so apparent to my perjudice.  
There is one thing that I must observe w<sup>ch</sup> is that he takes no notice  
of y<sup>e</sup> Blacknunny Negroes wh[ich] tho they are not able to work in  
15 years if they live will be fide young slaves and will at least be  
exported at y<sup>e</sup> end of y<sup>e</sup> lease If Capt. Burroll were willing to  
setme me Sixscore pounds a year to be payed in London to me  
or a hundred pounds flannu during the warre & six score after y<sup>e</sup>  
warre is ended I would accept it from him beforso I have some  
knowledge of him and of his character w<sup>ch</sup> is the cause I have been  
so reasonable in my proposalls to him wh[ich] I send here inclosed  
of wh[ich] I think he cannot disapprove the I am sensible of the  
Difficultie of getting a good Tonnant on reasonable terms in thi[n]  
hazardous time of Warre Yet when we come to ha[ve] a poart I am  
in hopes I may obteyne both with more ease In y<sup>e</sup> no time  
Iacknowlede my obligations to you for the care you are pleased  
to take of my interest and for your good deuise

some more Sugar on my attempt for I doubt That <sup>by</sup> Cap<sup>t</sup>.  
Rider will come short home or that I shall have a bad acc't  
of it but yo<sup>r</sup> Kindness was Nevertheless and I thank you for it  
I would have sent you a copy of a lease such as Mr<sup>r</sup> Dolus  
had but I know not whether my proposalls will be accepted  
by Cap<sup>t</sup>. Burroll if they be I desire that a just account may  
be taken of the present condition of my Interest and of the  
Indigo works & of all buildings standing and of plants  
growing upon my Plantation as sugar Canes Indigo &  
and Cotton &c still w<sup>ch</sup> pleases to yo<sup>r</sup> good Management  
that I may have a true state of my Interest when he enters  
upon it which he may do if he pleases upon signing  
and sealing to articles (in order to a lease) between  
you & Cap<sup>t</sup>. Willott as my attorney & Cap<sup>t</sup>. Burroll -  
drawn according to my proposalls or it may be I may  
send you a copy of a lease such as I would grant by  
w<sup>ch</sup> will do no harm tho' we do not proceed And if  
Cap<sup>t</sup>. Burrolls mind should alter or that he should be  
unwilling to become my Tenant on those reasonable  
terms I have proposed I desire that you will continuall  
to oblige me in yo<sup>r</sup> care of my Interests which I desire that  
it may pay you not only yo<sup>r</sup> necessary charges on my  
share expended but also rewards you & Cap<sup>t</sup>. W<sup>m</sup> Willott for  
yo<sup>r</sup> trouble therin only I desire an account once a year  
and if tenth of the increase is to be divided between you  
as you two a good & I shall still think my self much  
obliged to you If I should lett it I must still be holding to you  
to see y<sup>r</sup> Quality & weight of the sugar to be consigned to me  
And it is most proper for my Tenant whosoever he may  
be to have the trouble of shipping it for I would not account  
my Rent to be paid to me till it be shipped for my acc't  
I hope I shall hear by the next ships how you go on in this  
affair and you will add to those obligations by which I am
