I almost regret that you have  
accepted Mr Wildman's Bill for the Balance of the  
Amount at present, altho' perhaps you

declining it. - You will now be obliged to  
provide the money at the time and I  
fear from the prospect of the business  
leaving it so scarcely to be anticipated  
that you will receive any Rent by the  
time the bill becomes due

I have therefore returned the draft to Woldman saying I hoped to be able to pay it w<sup>th</sup>  
due but I cannot with any satisfaction concur with their  
request - I am obliged by your having wrote to Lyon it will have a  
lesser effect probably than if I had written - by yesterdays Coach I start you  
a Pheasant & Game w<sup>th</sup> a bottle of Liqueur
