Dear Col^{ly} Watson.

I am sending you in
separate envelope the Power of
Attorney with all instructions
as to the signing, witnessing, and
proving or declaration. I think
you will understand all that is
to be done, and to make it plain
I enclose the Solicitor's letter to me.

By a recent act of the Barbados
Legislature all such legal docu-
ments have been simplified, and
the declaration of the witness

with the affidavit of a Justice
of the Peace is sufficient, without
Mayor's seal &c. You need not
therefore take the trouble to come
up to London, but send me back
the Power after it is completed,
and I will take it to the Solicitor
for the proper stamp to be affixed.
Of course I shall be glad to see
you if you like to come up. In
such case please give me due
notice of day and hour either
for you to come here, or for me
to meet you in the City. I believe
12 O'clock is the hour which would
best suit Mr. Smith who had the

drawing of the Power, but a letter
would answer if I have time to
give him notice.

I ought to have said that you
should not sign your name as
witness, but any friend or even
the bailiff & a second person can
be witnesses.

I received your second letter
and was glad to find that
Mr. Meeker was so much better.

I hope he is gaining ground fast.
Our kind remembrances to him.
It was so pleasant to see him
as often as we did.

I am glad you gave me your

proper address, and that you opened
my first letter. I thought it
strange that you saw yourself
should have names or initials
so nearly alike. He told us what
his name in full was -
